## "By What Authority Doest Thou These Things?" Matthew 21:23

The above question, asked of our Lord by the chief priests and elders of the people, was a very valid question, even though their motive for asking it was impure. The word "authority" means to "have legal or rightful power, a right to command or to act, and to have jurisdiction." They also asked Jesus, "Who gave thee this authority?" (vs. 23). This too, is a very valid question.

Today, more than ever, I feel that this question needs not only to be asked but to be answered. Our Lord answered the Jews on this occasion (Matthew 21:25) with a question that states a profound truth concerning authority; He asked concerning the baptism of John, "Whence was it? From heaven or of men?" Everything you and I do religiously is authorized by one of these sources, Divine or Human.

The Bible is plain concerning the danger of human authority. Jeremiah 10:23 states, "The way of <u>man</u> is not in himself: it is not in <u>man</u> that walketh to direct his steps." Proverbs 14:12 states "There is a way which seemeth right unto a <u>man</u>, but the end thereof are the ways of death." Millions upon millions of people are following their own feelings, emotions, and religious traditions concerning the doctrine they teach and follow and the way they worship. The Lord says of those in Matthew 15:9, "In vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of <u>men</u>." Now, I don't know about you, but after reading warnings like these, I want to

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**know** "by what authority doest thou these things?"

This brings us to **Divine Authority**. Jesus declared in Matthew 28:18, "All authority is given unto me in heaven and in earth." He claims to have <u>all</u> authority; if so, how much does that leave me, a mere mortal? He also claims to have all authority in <u>heaven</u> and in <u>earth</u>; that pretty much covers where I will be living my short life span. A third thing He states is that this authority is **given to Him**. Remember the second question in our text in Matthew 21:25? Who gave this authority to Him?

The Bible answers that for us. Even though Jesus has all authority, it was delegated to Him from God. In John 17:1,2 Jesus prayed, "Father, the hour is come; glorify Thy Son, that Thy Son also may glorify Thee: as Thou hast given Him power (authority) over all flesh, that he should give eternal life to as many as Thou hast given Him." Ephesians 1:20-23 states that God set Christ far above all power (authority—vs. 2), and gave Him to be Head over all things to the church (vs. 22).

Jesus delegated this authority to His Apostles. In Matthew 16:19, Jesus told Peter He would give him the "keys" to the kingdom (or His church—vs. 18). The other Apostles were also promised this authority in Matthew 18:18. The Holy Spirit played a vital role in this process by being sent to bring to their remembrance all things Jesus had taught them (John 14:26; 15:26) and to guide them into all truth (John 16:13). These things were fulfilled when Peter and the other Apostles used these keys to open the door of the kingdom (church) to the Jews in Acts chapter 2 and to the Gentiles in Acts chapter 10.

The Apostles then delegated the authority of Christ to all mankind through the written word. In Ephesians 3:3-5 Paul states, "By revelation he made known unto me the mystery; (as I wrote afore in few words, Whereby, when ye read, ye may understand my knowledge in the mystery of Christ) Which in other ages was not made known unto the sons of men, as it is now revealed unto his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit;" Paul wrote by inspiration, but he states that we can understand it; in fact, he commands us to in Ephesians 5:17. In 1 Corinthians 14:37, Paul states "The things I write unto you are the commandments of the Lord." Whenever I read from the inspired men who wrote the Bible, I am reading what God wanted me to learn and practice. I, too, must operate only

on delegated authority. In Colossians 3:17 we are told "Whatsoever you do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus." The phrase "in the name of" means "by His authority." All I say or do, according to this verse, is to be authorized by Christ. Do you agree now that our question ("By what authority doest thou these things?") needs to be answered? It used to be important enough that people would use Book, Chapter and Verse for everything they practiced; now, sadly, that seems to be the last thing considered in religious practices.

Jesus is our Lord, yet He asked in Luke 6:46, "Why call ye Me, Lord, Lord, and do not the things I say?" Other warnings in the New Testament along this line are found in Matthew 7:21-23; 1 Corinthians 4:6; 2 John 9-11; Galatians 1:6-9 and Romans 16:17. We are to avoid unauthorized practices (error) like it was the plague! The natural question is, "How do I know if I am using the King's law lawfully?"

"By What Authority Doest
Thou These Things?" part 2

In the first part of this article, we noted that Jesus Christ has all authority (Matthew 28:18). Everything we do or say is to be authorized by Jesus (Colossians 3:17). That authority was delegated to the apostles and inspired men who delegated it to us, through the written word, to guide us in all things (2) Timothy 3:16,17; Ephesians 3:3-5; 1 Corinthians 14:37). The problem facing us today in religion is either a total disregard for authority or just not knowing how to apply the truth as revealed unto us. There is nothing we can do to help those who refuse to submit to the authority of Christ, but maybe we can list some principles revealed within God's word to help those who are struggling to learn the truth.

Jesus says we can know the truth (John 8:32); Paul commands us to understand what the will of the Lord is (Ephesians 5:17), and says that when we read the truth we can understand it (Ephesians 3:3,4). We do that when we "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." (2 Timothy 2:15). One version of this verse says to

"handle aright the word." Following will be some ways in which we "rightly divide", or "handle aright", the word in order to establish what should guide us as we worship and serve our Lord.

First, we must rightly divide the Old Law from the New. If we could just get folks to realize that "The law and the prophets were until John: since that time the kingdom of God is preached," (Luke 16:16), less religious differences would exist. Not only did Christ die on the cross, but so did the Old Law (Colossians 2:14-17). That is when the New Law went into force (Hebrews 9:15-17). Other passages that teach us that we are under the New Law are Galatians 3:22-25; Hebrews 8:6-13; and 10:9,10. In order to insure that we are practicing what Jesus authorized, we must use the New Testament as our guide today.

Second, we must sum up all that is revealed on a subject or topic in order to arrive at the truth. Jesus said in Matthew 4:4 "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God." Jesus used this same principle in Luke 24:27 "And beginning at Moses and all the prophets, He expounded unto them in all the scriptures the things concerning Himself."

One of the biggest mistakes people make along this line concerns how God will save us Most in the denominational world teach that only belief in Christ is necessary (John 3:16), and that by grace through this faith we are saved (Ephesians 2:8). They say there is nothing we must do in order to be saved. When you sum up ALL that is revealed on how to be saved, you indeed find FAITH being necessary (Hebrews 11:6; John 8:24), but you also find CONFESSION (Romans 10:9-10: Matthew 10:32-33), RE-PENTANCE (Luke 13:3; Acts 2:38; 3:19; 17:30-31), and BAPTISM (Mark 16:15-16: Acts 2:38; 1 Peter 3:21) being part of this plan. We are indeed saved by the grace of God, but it is only if we meet the conditions laid down in the will of Christ.

Third, we must keep things in their proper context. The text in Ephesians 2:8,9 is one where men fail to do this. They teach that we are saved by grace (which we are, vs. 8), but that there are no works for us to do because of verse 9. We must continue reading the context and include verse 10. It tells us "we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus"

unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them." There are works of men in this passage, and works of God that He gave for us to do. Which ones are involved in our salvation and which ones are not?

Fourth, we must never add to or take away from God's word. That is a principle we find from cover to cover in the Bible (Deuteronomy 4:2; Revelation 22:18-19). When we speak, we must speak as the oracles of God (1 Peter 4:11); whatever we practice in religion we must give book, chapter and verse.

Fifth, even the tense of a word or whether something is singular or plural, can reveal a great truth. For example, Jesus quoted Exodus 3:6 in Matthew 22:31.32 and emphasized the word "AM" to prove that God was still the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob long after they had died physically—they were still living spiritually. We can use this same principle today. In Colossians 1:13 Paul says "Who HATH (past tense) delivered us from the power of darkness, and HATH (again, past tense) translated us into the kingdom of His dear Son.' This teaches us the kingdom is now in existence and has been since Paul penned these words. Just this simple truth knocks one false doctrine in the head, and that is the doctrine of premillennialism.

In Galatians 3:16 Paul makes an argument from whether the word "seed" is singular or plural: "He saith not, and to SEEDS, as of many; but as of one, And to thy SEED, which is Christ." We can make the same argument from passages like Matthew 16:18 when Jesus told Peter "Thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my CHURCH". Notice, Jesus used the word "CHURCH" (singular, as of one), and not the word "CHURCHES" (plural, as of many). Just this simple principle teaches us that Jesus built only one church and not hundreds (or maybe thousands) that are built by men today!

How do we know if we are using the law of Christ lawfully? By diligent study and rightly dividing the word of truth. These are just a few of the principles laid down in the law, and I hope they may be profitable to you.

Next [week], Lord willing, we will be looking at how to establish Bible authority. Is it by the old way of direct command, approved apostolic example and necessary inference, or by what is called the "new hermeneutic"?
