# Is Sincerity Sometimes Enough

Christians have long objected to the demands for union and tolerance among denominational people. We have rightly pointed out that sincerity is simply not sufficient in determining acceptance before the Almighty. The claim that as long as a person is sincere in his worship, he is accepted by God does not jibe with what is revealed in His will. Notice Matthew 7:21-23, "Not everyone who says to Me, 'Lord, Lord,' shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who does the will of My Father in heaven. Many will say to Me in that day, 'Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in Your name, cast out demons in Your name, and done many wonders in Your name?' "And then I will declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from Me, you who practice lawlessness!" This verse clearly indicates that acceptance by God is dependent upon obedience to Him. He is accepted who "does the will of My Father in heaven."

Other verses teach the same exact thing. Notice 2 John, verse 9, "Whoever transgresses and does not abide in the doctrine of Christ does not have God. He who abides in the doctrine of Christ has both the Father and the Son." John is stating that acceptance by God is contingent upon fidelity to His revelation.

Following the declaration of John noted above, he further states in verses 10 and 11, "If anyone comes to you and does not bring this doctrine, do not receive him into your house nor greet him; for he who greets him shares in his evil deeds."

It is alarming that some brethren are now espousing the fellowship of someone who teaches false doctrine, or practices certain sins. Such clearly conflicts with the principles we enumerated above. However, some believe that they have found a "loophole" in the fourteenth chapter of Romans. The contention is that the principles outlined in that chapter, in which we are to, "Receive one who is weak in the faith, {but} not to disputes over doubtful things" (vs. 1), includes matters of doctrine.

Not only does this conflict with such passages as 2 John 9-11, as indicated above, it also does violence to the context of the chapter. Notice the following about the scenarios, (eating of meats, and observance of days), as revealed in the context.

- 1. Nothing is said of the one who abstained from eating meat being sinful, only weak (v. 2).
- 2. It was equally right to eat meat or eat only herbs, esteem or not esteem a day (vs. 3-5).
- 3. One could eat or not eat "to the Lord" (v. 6).

In effect, God does not care whether one eats or not. It is a matter of indifference to God, and therefore those who differ should receive one another. To insert matters of faith or doctrine, or things sinful into this passage does violence to the context. Put other things into the context ... false teaching, adultery, immorality, idolatry, etc., and the true meaning of Romans 14 becomes clear. To say that any Christian could practice sin, or espouse false doctrine and do it "to the Lord" is absurd! There is no comfort to be found in that great chapter for those who would fellowship error. Brethren, let us remain pure!

## Two Men Disagree with the Preacher

used a passage of scripture or has failed to consider a scripture that might affect his conclusion. He comes with an open Bible and an open mind, prepared to defend his position or to yield if he sees that it is indefensible.

The first man exalts self. He places too much confidence in his own thinking. He may do so unconsciously, but in reality he makes his own intellect and experience his god. His thinking is reflected in the words of Naaman, "Behold, I thought," words that would have taken Naaman to a leper's grave had it not been for the admonition of his servants (2 Kings 5:1-14).

The second man exalts God. His confidence is in what God says in the scriptures. He recognizes that his own intellect and experience fade into nothingness when placed

in the brightness of the light of truth. A "thus saith the Lord" ends all controversy with him. His thinking is reflected in that of the Bereans who "were more fair-minded than those in Thessalonica, in that they... searched the Scriptures daily to find out whether these things were so" (Acts 17:11).

Unless the first man changes his attitude he is hopeless. He is susceptible to all manner of false ideas. He cannot come to know God and His truth through his own wisdom (1 Corinthians 1:21). He must throw his own wisdom, intellect, and experience aside; he must become poor in spirit, meek before God, mourning, hungering and thirsting for righteousness; he must bow in submission to the Lord and to His word. He must say with Paul, "Oh, the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable are His judgments and His ways past finding out! For who has known the mind of the LORD? Or who has become His counselor?" (Romans 11:33-34).

The second man is a blessed and fortunate man indeed, for he will learn the truth that will make him free (John 8:32). Unfortunately, he is a rare man in the twentieth century. But he does exist—and he can exist even in the man who is presently reading this article.

What a challenge to each of us! After all, it is one thing to disagree with a preacher, but quite another thing to disagree with Almighty God!

## Broken Cisterns

Everything we were ever created to need can be found in the God who made us. But we don't always allow Him to satisfy us. When we could be slaking our thirst with the fresh waters of a sparkling spring, we content ourselves with the stagnant contents of a holding tank. This does not make good sense. Why would we do such a foolish thing?

Generally, we do foolish things when we have been deceived as to the facts of our situation. And when it comes to the created needs that are deep within us, we have a spiritual adversary who is a past master at making his cheap counterfeits look better than the fulfillments that God offers. The devil's deceptions are not clever enough to withstand very close scrutiny and it's only a matter of time until we discover the truth, but in the very short term, he can make black look white and vice versa. He can actually lead us to believe that a broken cistern is better than the fountain of living water. And unfortunately, he has had a certain amount of success in getting us to act on that untruth.

Life is full of discoveries, however, and many of them are sad ones. "A thousand voices clamor for our attention, and a thousand causes vie for our support. But until we have learned to be satisfied with fellowship with God, until he is our rock and our fortress, we will be restless with our place in the world" (Erwin W. Lutzer). In the long run, if not in the short, we find that nothing we've ever substituted for God has quenched our thirst. Eternity is in our hearts, and nothing but God can satisfy our souls.
