Great Peace Bill Feist

The longest chapter in the Bible (Psalm 119) is a song of praise to the word of God. Nearly every verse makes mention of the word of God. Every verse contains either praise of God's word from some excellent quality of it; or a protestation of David's unfeigned affection towards it; or the desire of David to conform himself to it.

This psalm is a prolonged meditation upon the excellence of the word of God. It is the fruit of deep experience, careful observation, and earnest meditation by its author. Consider the shepherd boy David as he cares for the sheep. At night, when they are bedded down, David must have surveyed the starry skies and contemplated the Scriptures. Here is a psalm that reveals his great love for God's word as he rolled it over and over again in his mind. What David does in this psalm is much the same as a young lady in love. She often sits and dreams of the future. As she thinks, she may write the various ways her name can be joined with that of her future husband. If you have ever done such a thing, you can identify with what David does in this psalm; only the object of David's affection is God's word.

This verse touches on a subject near to the heart of each of us: "peace." But what kind of peace is the psalmist speaking of here? Is it "world peace"? This is a constant concern of each of us. How many prayers are offered to God in which we pray that we might be able to live "a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty" (1 Timothy 2:2)? Yet,

world peace is not the author's concern. Is it "peace" in our homes? An honest look at our homes reminds us that many families are in trouble and know no peace. The divorce statistics speak loudly about homes without in them. peace "generation gap" between parents and young people where arguments rage or likewise isolation exists speaks of little peace in a But this is not it. home. Could it be "internal peace"? Once again, many people know no peace in

their own lives, as the rising suicide statistics manifest; but this is not it. What "peace" is it? It is "peace with God!" Once we have this peace, it enables us as much as possible to be at peace with all men (Romans 12:18), maintain peace in our families as we follow God's way (Ephesians 5:21-6:4), and to have peace with ourselves (Romans 8:1).

We need to note that this peace cannot be separated from loving God's law. We are not going to find the peace spoken of here in human wisdom, philosophy, psychology, sociology, etc. "Great peace" is revealed only in God's word—the last place some people even begin to think of looking for it. The God who made us knows what great peace is and how it can be attained and maintained. What connection does "and nothing shall offend them" (the possessors of this great peace) have to do with this thought? The "offend" here means to stumble or to fall away from

the faith; to apostatize. The thought is: those who possess this great peace of God will not allow anything to cause them to stumble or fall away from the faith. These properly evaluate the "great peace" of God and refuse to relinquish it for any reason. When we fully appreciate the value of God's great peace we will be faithful unto death (Revelation 2:10).

Satan will attempt to persuade us that God's "great peace" is not so valuable. In the

parable of the Sower, Jesus proclaims those who are "wayside soil" never come to understand the value of the great peace of God in the first place. They dismiss it and the devil catches away the word immediately lest they believe and be saved. The "rocky soil' see the value of the great peace and embraces it, but "in time of temptation falls away" (Luke 8:13). The "thorny soil" are they which go forth and "are

choked with cares and riches and pleasure of this life" (Luke 8:14). Do you see that the "rocky and thorny soil" stumbled at the offerings of Satan? They decided it was not worth it to be a faithful Christian and fell away. Their root problem was that they did not properly evaluate the great peace of God. The faithful Christian faces the same problems along the road of life as did the others, but he understands the value of God's great peace and brings forth fruit with patience (Luke 8:15).

How is it in your life? Are you someone who once embraced the great peace of God, but have turned again to the world? You need to consider the great peace of God; nothing in this world can compare to it (Matthew 16:26). If you are faithfully serving the Lord, one of the reasons why you are doing so is because, "Great peace have they which love thy law: and nothing shall offend them."

"Now may the God of peace...

make you complete in every good
work to do His will, working in you
what is well pleasing in His sight,
through Jesus Christ, to whom be
glory forever and ever. Amen" —
Hebrews 13:20,21

There is nothing "objective about God's attitude toward us. We are creatures brought into being by His love, and when a way for us to be redeemed could only be purchased by the life of His Son, He did not stop short of making that sacrifice. The question of our well-being is one in which He has a vested interest, to say the very least. He is for us. He is on our side. He is passionately biased in our favor. There is nothing good for us in this whole wide world that He is not eager and able to provide.

There is a sense in which God is eager to do good for every person He has created, even those who show no respect for Him. Jesus said that "He makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust" (Matthew 5:45).

There is also a sense in which He cares for those who have obeyed the gospel of His Son and who have remained faithful to Him. It is to obedient Christians that Peter wrote, "Let those who suffer according to the will of God commit their souls to Him in doing good, as to a faithful Creator" (1 Peter 4:19). "Humble yourselves under the mighty hand of God," he continued, "... casting all your care upon Him, for He cares for you" (1 Peter 5:6,7).

But there is a third point that must be made. Even when it is God's faithful saints who are under consideration, the needs that He is most eager to supply are those relating to His rule. When Paul made his familiar statement in Philippians 4:13, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me," he was not speaking of goals like making a million dollars or winning an Olympic gold medal. He was simply stating his confidence that Christ wouldn't let him go without anything he needed to do His, that is, Christ's, work.

Whatever God expects us to do to accomplish His purposes, He will help us to do! And help in doing those things is what we ought to desire, far more than we desire His help with lesser concerns. In anything related to the gospel of Christ, we needn't worry about coming up short. He will "make [us] complete in every good work to do His will, working in [us] what is well pleasing in His sight."
