## REMEMBER WHO YOU PLAY FOR

I have a pretty big weakness for tolerating phalange related injuries. My eyes wince shut and sympathy pain shivers down my spine any time I think of someone with a finger or toe injury. I know I'm super weird. That is the reason I still have not and probably will never watch the footage of Boston Celtics player, Gordon Hayward, dislocating his left ankle and fracturing his left tibia in their season opener against the Cleveland Cavs. Midway through the first quarter Haywood attempted to catch an alleyoop pass for a dunk. He landed awkwardly on his left foot, and everyone knew immediately something awful had happened. Hayward collapsed under the basket

and looked in horror as his left foot was pointing outward. After the injury, several of Hayward's teammates huddled in prayer while many covered their mouths and looked away. While I am still among those looking away refusing to even look at any of the images, I have found myself looking at his example of faith. Gordon Hayward is very vocal about his spiritual life and has no shame in stating that his primary motivation for playing professional basketball is to glorify God. "My parents (Gordon Scott Hayward and Jody Hayward) went to church every Sunday. They have been there for me my whole life. They took me to church. It's always been a

staple; something I try to do." In an article where he was asked about how much of an influence God is in his life, he mentions that before every game his mother sends a reminder to him in a text message: "Remember who you play for." "It helps to remind myself why I am doing this, I am playing for the glory of God. It makes life easier. It takes a lot of pressure off of you. My inspiration first and foremost always has to be God. I play every game for Him and after that my inspiration is my family." I found that to be so encouraging and such a great statement...Remember who you play for! It is no secret that the moment you make any kind of public profession of your faith in God and desire to glorify Him in everything that you do that you are going to be watched extremely closely. Count me among those who may be watching Gordon Hayward a bit more closely now that I know he is playing his sport for a higher calling than fame and money. I'll be watching him closely when someone sends him to the floor with a hard foul, when he doesn't

get a call to go his way, when his team loses a game, or when some fan of an opposing team is yelling something derogatory at him from the stands. I'll be watching, not as a skeptic hoping he somehow fails to respond as you'd hope and expect someone living for God's glory would. I'll be watching as a reminder that my curiosity in how deeply convicted his professed faith really is as reflected in his demeanor is exactly the same way others in my life inevitably will be looking at me. Every time I bow my head in prayer in a crowded restaurant, and others see my faith in God on public display, do I not realize others may be watching me a bit more closely to see how I react if my order is wrong or receive sub-par service? I can remember being reminded of this a few years ago waiting in line behind a large group of worshipers who had just gotten out of their services to have a meal at a fast food restaurant. Several of them were very rudely talking down to the workers taking their order and making their meals.


