THE SOUR GRAPES

In Ezekiel 18:2-3, Ezekiel told the people, "The word of the LORD came unto me again, saying, What mean ye, that ye use this proverb concerning the land of Israel, saying, The fathers have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge? As I live, saith the Lord GOD, ve shall not have occasion any more to use this proverb in Israel." The proverb that the children of Israel used had to do with those who taught that the guilt of a man's sins was inherited through his father. Thus, while the "fathers" ate the sour grapes, the "children's" teeth were the ones set on edge! Does this proverb sound familiar? The doctrine of inherited sin (Total Hereditary Depravity) states that we are born with a "sinful nature" because Adam sinned. With such. we are born sinners, and there is nothing we can do about it. We can do nothing "good" by ourselves. We might be familiar with this teaching through the acronum "THI IP" Our study will

focus on the "T" in the abbreviation (Total Hereditary Depravity, or Inherited Sin). This is the cornerstone of the doctrine popularly described as "Calvinism." Though folks before Christ's time had taught it, and Augustine taught it in his time, it was John Calvin who "popularized" it. Still, if we can prove the first point of this doctrine to be untrue, the rest of the doctrine falls. The Fall Of Adam. When discussing "inherited" sin, it is only logical to look to the first man and see if he actually placed sin upon all mankind. Therefore, we need to see what Adam's nature was in the beginning. psalm is very personal. He confessed that he had been a sinner from an early age. Thus, he asks for God's forgiveness of his sins and his sins alone! Another passage to study is Psalm 51:7 and 9-12. David said, "Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean: wash me, and I shall he whiter than snow Hide thy face from my sins, and blot out all mine iniquities. Create in me a clean heart, O God; and renew a right spirit within me. Cast me not away from thy presence; and take not thy holy spirit from me. Restore unto me the joy of thy salvation; and uphold me with thy free spirit." David begged God's forgiveness for his sins. Why was David not concerned with Adam's sin or his children's sin in this psalm? It is because he knew that his sin was not inherited, nor would he "pass" his guilt on to others! He would answer for his own sins and no one else's! Some have claimed that the apostle Paul taught "inherited" sin in Romans 3:23. He wrote, "For all have sinned. and come short of the glory of God." In truth, this passage teaches that each individual sins when he chooses to transgress God's law. He said, "All have sinned." This phrase shows action on the part of every individual. James said, "But every man is tempted, when he is drawn away of his own lust, and enticed. Then when lust hath conceived, it bringeth forth sin: and sin, when it is finished, hringeth forth death" (las. 1:1415). If we can understand James, we can understand that Paul was teaching the same thing about temptation and sin! He continued by saying that those that have sinned "come short of the glory of God." Paul did not say that men were "born short of the glory of God." Paul showed that every man has a choice to make. Another passage that the Calvinist uses is Romans 5:12. It says, "Wherefore, as by one man sin entered into the world, and death by sin; and so death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned." Once again, this shows action and decision-making on the part of each individual (Jas. 1:14-15). For this verse to say what the Calvinist wants, it would have to read, "Wherefore, as by one man sin entered into the world, and death by sin; and so death passed upon all men, by Adam's sin." These are not the only passages used, but these are common ones used by the Calvinists. In truth, these passages teach the opposite of what the Calvinist wishes to teach. Conclusion. The text of Ezekiel 18 teaches that man does not inherit sin. Read Ezekiel 18:4, 20. Why did God have to tell the people that they did not inherit their father's sin? The reason is that they didn't listen to God in Deuteronomy 24:16! God said, "As I live, saith the Lord GOD, ye shall not have occasion any more to use this proverb in Israel" (Ezek. 18:3). - Jarrod **Iacobs**
