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YOU ARE IN THE BIBLE

The last book of the Bible was written about 96 A.D. Since then, we have had 66 books of the Bible (39 Old Testament books, 27 New Testament books) that provide us with God's guidance and establish and strengthen our faith (Rom. 10:17; Jude 3; II Tim. 3:16-17). However, after 2000 years, folks call the Bible "outdated," "unrealistic," and the like. Some folks wonder how we can make applications to our lives when using the Bible. Yet, as we study the Bible, it becomes clear that we can't help but apply the Scriptures to ourselves! What do I mean by saying, "You are in the Bible"? I know your name is probably not in the Bible. However, God, in His providence, saw down the stream of time and inspired men to write things that apply to us today (II Pet. 1:20-21). Therefore, by necessary inference, we are in there! Let

us look at some examples of the fact that you and I are in the Bible. Galatians 3:26-29. Yes, this book is addressed to the Galatian Christians (Gal. 1:2). At the same time, this book is written for us! When one becomes a Christian (i.e., a child of God by faith, v. 26), it is because this person has been baptized into Christ (v. 27). In becoming Christ's, we also are "Abraham's seed and heirs according to the promise" (v. 29). What promise is this? It is the promise God made to Abraham in Genesis (see: Gal. 3:16)! In other words, when someone becomes a Christian. he becomes the "seed of Abraham" and fulfills God's promise that Abraham's seed would be "as the stars of the heaven, and as the sand which is upon the sea shore; and thy seed shall possess the gate of his enemies" (Gen. 22:17). Just think, every time one becomes

a Christian, he takes his place in a promise God made so long ago. If you are a Christian (Acts 2:38, 11:26), you are a part of this promise. You are in the Bible! II Timothy 2:2 Similar to the Galatian letter, though this letter was written to Timothy (1:2), what was written was written for us! In reading this Scripture, we see a progressive line of thought. Let us read this carefully and note the progression."The things that thou hast heard of me" The apostle Paul taught Timothy (Acts 16:1-5; etc.), so the "me" in this verse is Paul. Where did Paul get his knowledge? He got it from Christ (Gal. 1:12). Therefore, what Christ taught him, he taught Timothy. "The same commit thou to faithful men" Now that Timothy had heard and obeyed the truth, he needed to be active in teaching others (I Cor. 4:17; I Thess. 3:2-3; I Cor. 16:10). Just as Timothy would be able to take the gospel to lost souls, so also, he needed to prepare people to spread the gospel to places he could not go. "Who shall be able to teach others also...." This phrase shows how the "cycle" continues. Those Timothy taught needed to be able to teach "others" so those folks could teach "others" and so on.

Therefore, the same thing

taught in the first century reaches to this present day! Thus, the need for our generation to teach "others"! We are a "link" in the chain that will continue to grow until the end of time. *We* are in II Timothy 2:2! Matthew 5:32, 19:9. Though some folks have said that these passages apply only to those under the Law of Moses, Jesus applied it to people who were going to be living under the New Covenant when He said, "whosoever." These verses apply to every person in every era and in every society since the New Testament took effect (Col. 2:14; Heb. 9:15-16). For those who insist that Jesus' words were spoken to somehow "correct" those under the Old Testament, how do we explain that Jesus' statement concerning marriage (without the "exception") is repeated in Romans 7? Suppose Christ intended for what He said to be applied only to those living under Moses' Law. Why then did the apostle Paul teach this to the Romans who were living after the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ and subject to the New Covenant (law of Christ, Gal. 6:2)? No, Christ's law for marriage was not something given to "correct" those living in Old Testament days. It is for us today. You are in these verses

Titus 3:3-8

"For we also once were foolish ourselves, disobedient, deceived, enslaved to various lusts and pleasures, spending our life in malice and envy, hateful, hating one another. But when the kindness of God our Savior and His love for mankind appeared, He saved us, not on the basis of deeds which we have done in righteousness, but according to His mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewing by the Holy Spirit, whom He poured out upon us richly through Jesus Christ our Savior, so that being justified by His grace we would be made heirs according to the hope of eternal life. This is a trustworthy statement; and concerning these things I want you to speak confidently, so that those who have believed God will be careful to engage in good deeds. These things are good and profitable for men."
